11th hour An change of heart has saved a struggling town farming family from eviction.

The Hollins family from Fordhall Farm were due to be thrown off the 140-acre site yesterday, Thursday. But brother and sister team Charlotte and Ben have now been given an 18-month reprieve to prove their acumen trustees.

They also hope to eventually buy the farm with the help of a Defra grant once they get some security.

Charlotte told the Advertiger: "We had a last minute meeting yesterday with the agent and landlord and instead of throwing us out, they offered us an 18month tenancy to prove our-

"We've got to get a business plan together, tidy the farm up and look at re-stock-

"The plan by the end of the 18 months is to show that we can run the farm and to secure enough money to buy it from the trust for £500,000, though we don't really know what the land will fetch by that time

"The trustees they didn't know what their intentions were for the land and they were

Charlotte added: originally offered us a 12-month tenancy but realised that wasn't long enough to prove anything, so they extended it.

"We're now looking for more local suppliers, but we can't sell anything on until we've had a health and safety check." Meanwhile, the ambitious

Fordhall project - which aims to turn the farm into a tourist attraction - is on until backburner the business is running as a

Charlotte, who is a member of the Taste of the Town Company, said she was also considering setting up a stall at the summer festival to

boost their profile.

She added: "We still intend to go through with the Fordhall Project but we just don't have the time at the moment.

"It will be Ben and I doing most of the work. We think dad deserves a rest after all the years he has put in on the farm. It's our turn now."
